Adobe Acrobat XI

OCIO will be installing Adobe Acrobat XI starting next month. Acrobat XI adds new features to allow you to edit or correct both text and images from within a PDF, improves signature features, and easier conversion to and from Office documents.




IMPROVED Create PDFs in Office

From the Acrobat XI task ribbon in your Microsoft Office application, you can create PDFs, start a shared review, restrict PDF edits, and more.*




Choose Adobe PDF as your printer

If you know how to print a paper document, you know how to create a PDF. It's that simple.



IMPROVED Save web pages as PDF files

Archive web content, review web pages offline, or print them more reliably with Acrobat XI.



Scan paper documents into searchable PDFs

Run optical character recognition in Acrobat XI to turn a scanned document into a searchable PDF file.

April Tech Tips

• Windows XP support expired

A new vulnerability was found in Microsoft's Internet Explorer versions IE6 - IE11. This is the first major security vulnerability that Microsoft has announced will **NOT** be fixed for Windows XP. If you are still using Windows XP at home, your security level will continue to decrease as time goes on.

Now might be a good time to review your computer's status and either purchase a new version of Windows or buy a new computer. Continuing to use Windows XP puts your online activities (social

networking, online banking, email, etc), and your locally stored information, at risk (tax documents, photos, email archives, saved correspondence, etc.)
